University of Lincoln Criminology Lecture

Year 12

On June 8th the Year 12 Psychology students were lucky enough to secure free tickets to attend a lecture by the very famous criminologist David Wilson at the University of Lincoln.

In case you are thinking, who?? David Wilson is a university professor and a former prison governor who has worked with some of the most dangerous and notorious criminals in Britain. He specialises in studying serial killers and has worked with the British police, written books and made lots of media appearances, most recently with Emilia Fox in a Channel 4 real crime documentary called 'In the Footsteps of Killers'.

His podcast, about incidences of true crime, 'If it bleeds, it leads' is one of the top 10 podcasts currently.

The lecture focused on his most recent research into British serial murders, looking at the demographic of typical victims and what society

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One Dance UK - Young Creatives Showcase 2022

On 19 June 2022, the Midlands Arts Centre (MAC) Birmingham hosted the most incredible showcase of young dance talent, in a special performance of only 10 selected pieces of original and independent work choreographed by young people from around the UK. The show was introduced by Sir Richard Alston and I was the youngest dancer to perform.



I was lucky enough to have been invited as part of a group from Xzibit Young Creatives. Our piece investigated sensory overload and how it feels to try and cope with sensory input as a young person with sensory processing difficulties.

The Xzibit programme is and award-winning choreographic and talent development programme which runs each year in the Midlands. It is an artist-led hip hop dance theatre project, that focuses on developing the young dance creatives of the future through an intensive choreographic mentoring programme. It is led by the amazing Gareth Woodward and Jasmine Eccles with internationally renowned guest choreographers. The programme finishes with a performance of the original works in professional venues.

The award scheme did not want the fantastic achievements of these students to go unrecognised and put on a special celebration event in May within the Buckingham Palace Gardens.

I was invited to join the students who achieved their Gold Award with South Wolds in recognition of the support I gave to our students in helping them achieve their awards.

Prince Edward, the Duke of Wessex hosted the event with celebrities such as Ben Fogle, (adventurer, writer and presenter), Johannes Radebe (professional dancer from Strictly), Tim Campbell (the Apprentice) and Nina Wadia (actress), who all talked about their Gold Award experience and how this has influenced them.

The Duke of Edinburgh is a challenge award with three levels (Bronze, Silver and Gold) demanding a commitment of at least an hour a week working on skill, physical and volunteering to be completed within a specific timescale. In addition, there is the preparation and completion of a walking expedition and at Gold level only, a 5 day residential.

All Gold Award achievers receive an invitation to Buckingham Palace to receive their award.

I am delighted to announce we have our fourth Gold Award achiever since I took on running the award in 2014. They will be receiving their invitation to the Palace in due course.

Every penny donated goes straight towards the front line to help provide the critical care that both Alex and his girlfriend, Joella, need.



The eight-novel challenge is not an easy feat for some, particularly those who juggled it with revising for exams. However, the Friday lunch time discussions highlighted how much they relished the opportunity to read and review some great teen-fiction with like-minded peers.

Perhaps this is not surprising when considering the range of stories on offer this year. The 2022 shortlist included Sue Divin's 'Guard Your Heart': an exciting 'Romeo and Juliet' style love story set in modern Ireland, Alex Wheatle's 'Cane Warriors', which tells the story of an eighteenth-century slave uprising in Jamaica and Zoboi and Salaam's powerful 'Punching the Air' - a deeply-affecting verse novel about a teen who has been incarcerated for a crime that he did not commit.

As a group, we voted 'The Crossing' by Manjeet Mann the most medal-worthy for its compelling plot, strong characterisation and compassionate approach to discussing the tragedies of the refugee crisis. The judges however did not agree. This year's official winner was 'October, October' by Katya Balen – a beautifully-written story of the wilderness and family secrets. Although not our group's first choice, it was a worthy winner.

We celebrated the end of our Carnegie shadowing fun with a quiz, some hilarious 'reduced' versions of the novels and, of course, plenty of biscuits.



Transition Update

At the end of June we were delighted to welcome nearly 200 Year 6 students, who will be starting at South Wolds in September, for two Transition Days. This followed a month long programme of transition visits to over a dozen of our feeder primary schools by Mr Gell and Mr Askham, where they met the children and their teachers.

On the first Transition Day, students met their new tutor and registration group as well as enjoying four taster lessons, ranging from Bunsen Burner Safety in Science to Forensic Analysis in Maths, Shape Poems in English to Plasticine Modelling in Art.

In the evening of the first day, we welcomed the parents of our new students to a packed hall and refectory where they had the opportunity to meet the key staff involved in supporting their child's move to South Wolds.

This was our first in-person transition days since 2019 and it was a real delight to witness our new students exploring their new school and meeting teachers and support staff.

On the second Transition Day, the Year 6 students celebrated diversity across the world by taking part in International Day.

Throughout the day, the students had the opportunity to take part in a variety of excellent workshops run by staff across the school focusing on different cultures and traditions from around the world.

These workshops included:

- Learning Bhangra Dance and exploring world sports with the PE department
- Designing their own flags in Geography department
- Studying different poems from around the world in English
- Learning some Italian and practising their communication skills in Languages
- Making their own Chinese fireworks in Science
- Learning to play Chinese music with the Music department
- Designing their own Rangoli patterns in Maths
- Improving their team-work and communication skills in 'tent teams'



We have also commenced the training of our Student Transition Mentors who will be on hand to support our new Year 7 students from September with adjusting to life at South Wolds. The student volunteers span all of our year groups and will follow a year long programme from the Kidscape organisation, designed to develop their mentoring skills.

A great day was had by students and staff, and a massive thank you to everyone who helped welcome the Year 6 students to South Wolds. We can't wait for September!
