Year 9 have started thinking about some poems linked to conflict and made a 3D trench inspired by Wilfred Owen's 'Exposure,' which highlights the pity of war.







stories about witches and wizards. 'An


illustrated collection of short stories by

fights, pirates, wizards and crooks!




Girls in Love is a funny, frank take on friendship, problems and heartaches that older fans will adore. It is about girls in Year 9. Suitable for Year 7s upwards.

Year 12 visited Magdalen College at The University of Oxford

On Tuesday 15th November, 30 Year 12 students visited Magdalen College at The University of Oxford. The purpose of the trip was to learn more about making an Oxbridge application, have a tour around the colleges and attend 2 taster lectures delivered by Oxford academics.

We visited The Greenland Library, the junior common room and the accommodation at Brasenose and thought we had disappeared down a Harry Potter rabbit hole! This college was founded in 1509, the buildings and the chapel were beautiful.

The students were spoilt with a waiter-served hot dinner in the dining room at Magdalen, very different to our usual lunch down at the Keyworth co-op!

In the afternoon we heard a lecture from one of the leading researchers in the field of Biological Science on Microbial Evolution and a Professor of Law who engaged us with a current highly publicised legal case Fearn & Ors Vs the Tate Gallery (a case brought by a man who lives in a glass walled apartment overlooked by the viewing gallery at the Tate). This generated much debate amongst the students about human rights, privacy and security.

It was an amazing day and the outreach team at Oxford couldn't do enough for us.

Over to the students now, to complete the application form, the assessment tests, sit the interviews and bag 3 excellent A level grades!
