

The event included: talks on the industrial and medicinal applications of AI; seeing first-hand the development and function of robots; a coding workshop on machine learning; and a student ambassador panel Q and A session.

We enjoyed learning about how AI can be used to monitor lorries and use the constantly accumulated data to alert other drivers of potential danger hotspots, although our favourite session included watching how assistance robots are fed data and seeing how some could look in the future - utilising features such as collision detection and pathfinding using lidar.





Rachel is now looking at studying for a year abroad as part of her degree and Polly wants to study French and Art History, both decisions influenced by the amazing experience we had in Lyon.



We are also hoping to enter some teams in the NCSC (National Cyber Security Centre) CyberFirst Girls Competition.

The competition is open to teams of 4 students that identify as female in Year 8. Whatever your ability, from beginner to expert, the CyberFirst Girls Competition is an opportunity to learn something new about cyber security.

The content for each category of the competition is consistent with subjects within the Computer Science syllabus from both the National Curriculum.

However, the competition will contain some advanced cyber topics that are not covered in traditional education but will seek to stretch the lateral thinking and additional cyber knowledge of the teams.
