We have lots of ideas about how we are going to get the whole school community choosing to read and engage with books more often, one of which is giving a reading update in each newsletter. Keep an eye out for future editions to see how our story is going!

> For four weeks in the run up to Christmas we held a Readathon (a bit like a marathon but with less running and more books) where students were encouraged to read as much as possible and get sponsored by their friends and family for doing so. All money raised is used to buy books for children in hospitals all over the country, with the school also being awarded 10% of all donations to spend on books for the school library. The students' response to this was excellent and our overall total was a fantastic  $\pounds$ 306.86! Isabelle W in Year 7 was our top reader; she raised over  $\pounds$ 100 and was presented with a prize in assembly last week. Thank you to Isabelle and all our other fabulous readers.



We are very excited to share that the school has subscribed to The Day, an online news outlet aimed at children and teenagers. The Day features articles about national and international events, as well as opinion pieces about a wide variety of topics including climate change, politics and technology. Each article gives you the option to choose the reading level that best suits you, as well as offering you the choice to look at articles based around your favourite subject or topic. We are starting to trial setting reading homework via The Day in a small number of subjects, but in the meantime the website is available for free to all students at South Wolds, so please get involved and start exploring what it has to offer. There is a 16% increase in progress for students who regularly listen to reading out loud according to the Open University, so after half term we will be launching an exciting initiative where, for students in Year 9, the teachers will be treating students to story time in tutor time. This all began with Ms Haywood reading Oi Frog! to a captivated group of teenagers in assembly and will be continued by a range of teachers from all different subject areas, reading stories from all sorts of genres and writers. We're really excited about the opportunity to share our passion for reading with our students in a way that is reminiscent of their earlier childhood and schooling experiences, and to remind them that 'once upon a time' they all loved reading.

If you want to borrow one of our lovely books during the Summer term, please come to the library at break or lunch. You can also read, do homework or sit quietly with a couple of friends.






Our Year 7 Fristory project was looking at 'Castles', and to help us really understand more about them, we were set a task to design our own and work within a budget to make decisions on what to include.




# **Lessons from Auschwitz**

In March, myself and another Sixth Form student took part in the Lessons from Auschwitz project. In this programme we attended seminars where we learnt about Jewish life during the time of the Second World War, the history of the Holocaust and then finally we took a trip to Auschwitz in Poland.

For me, like lots of others, I have only heard about the Holocaust at school and only then in terms of numbers and statistics. Taking part in this project has really helped me to understand that behind each of those statistics are individuals who lived lives just like you and me. I found it very impactful seeing the photos of those imprisoned in Auschwitz as despite all wearing the same clothes, being tattooed and having a shaved head, each person had a completely different look on their face, had loved ones, had a different story as to how they got there.



This really showed me that the Holocaust wasn't just an event in History, it happened to real people who were just going about their lives like you or I.



I think that it is incredibly important to educate ourselves on topics like these, especially in the current day, as we are living in a time where it feels like more and more we are wilfully forgetting the mistakes of our past, for example like Kanye West outwardly and unapologetically supporting Hitler and with the mass genocide of the Uyghurs in camps in China. It seems that as we get further away from the time at which the Holocaust happened, people are letting go of everything history should have taught us. However it is imperative that as a population we make sure to keep ourselves educated, so that when we see people or regimes that are promoting hate towards others we know to call it out.
